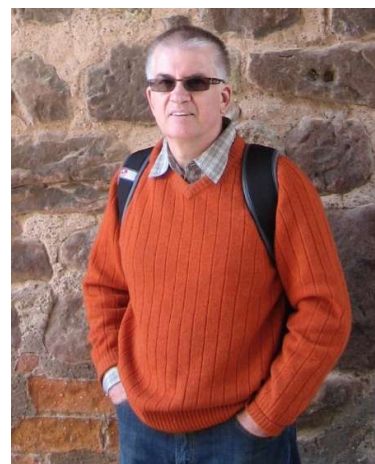
BIOGRAPHY

Introduction

My interest in the Bean/Beane surname results from my ancestry where, on my direct line, I find Mary Bean marrying James Chambers at Denton in East Sussex in 1674. Her ancestry comes from the primary Bean family line in East Sussex which I have sought to develop and document here through the use of all available wills and administrations (admons) in addition to the available parish records.

Most of the Beans that I have been able to research have descended from the sons and daughters of this primary family line which is shown in Chapter 2 as “Tree 1. John Beane the Elder of [East] Blatchington”. Of the other three family trees shown in Chapter 2, the Beans of Willingdon and Chiddingfold is highly likely connected to Tree 1; the Wivelsfield Beans tree is distinct, originating in West Sussex; and the Beans of Rye are of an unknown origin.

The surname Beany appears to be a variant spelling of Beane and the transition between the spelling Beany-Beane-Bean can be seen in the parish registers of Hastings in particular.

The Beans of East Blatchington and Litlington

In the 1500s, the Bean family was farming at East Blatchington, near Seaford. John Bean (c1500-1567) was a husbandman of East Blatchington and his grandson John Bean (c1555-1642) was a yeoman of East Blatchington and also a jurat of Seaford, meaning that he was a member of the town governing council. The family maintained a strong connection to East Blatchington until just before 1700 when Henry Bean, a tenant farmer who had married Mary Savage in 1684, leased two farms at Litlington: Upper Clapham (Clapham Manor) and Lower Clapham, with the family moving to Clapham House.

Following his death in March 1702/03 the lease of the property passed to his son John Bean Snr and later his son John Bean Jnr, with both acquiring more properties as they became

available, including Charleston Manor and the manor of Litlington which was merged with the Clapham estate.

According to the Cuckmere Valley Parish website:¹

“John Bean Snr died in 1749 having accumulated considerable wealth. He had developed his estate at a time of great change in agriculture. He deserted the small highly priced arable plots that had been farmed for centuries in favour of purchasing larger holdings formerly part of monastic estates. He exploited improved farm techniques to put downland to the plough and bred large flocks of Southdown sheep on the remaining downland, which became the leading breed of its day.”

Unfortunately there is a gap in the records so that the marriage of John Bean Snr and the birth of his two children John and Ann have not been found. The marriage of his daughter Ann to Henry Read, a very wealthy grazier in Brookland, Kent, reveals an interesting connection to the Romney Marsh area where broader scale sheep farming was practiced.

John Bean Jnr inherited the estate in 1749 and managed it well until he died in April 1785. At that time, Litlington “consisted of 20 cottages, the church, the farm and the ‘big house’, Clapham, from which the Bean family ...dominated village life”.

However, the estate suffered under the ownership of the next owner, John Bean, son of John Bean Jnr and his housekeeper Mary Bridgeman (with whom John Bean jnr had a long term relationship), and later his son Felix Bean who was largely an absentee landlord. In 1830, the Bean estate was sold by Felix Bean to Reverend Thomas Scutt for £39,500 including stock, carriages and horses.²

There are many respected families connected to the Bean family. Surnames such as Chambers, Swaine, Davis, Keating, Savage, Martin, Towner, Sturte, Playsted, Price, Parsons and Young are frequently found in the Bean wills as they married into the family at various times. Many of these were, at certain times, lords of various manors as were the Beans. The index of names at the back of this book can be used to find them.

Origins of the Bean Surname

The surname Bean in Sussex has deep historical and etymological roots in early Anglo-Saxon language and geography. Its origins in the region primarily spring from the following pathways:

1. Occupational Roots

As documented in *A Dictionary of English Surnames* by Reaney and Wilson, the Old English *bēan* was regularly applied to a grower or seller of beans (similar to how the surname Barley or Pease was used). Early medieval English tax rolls feature variations like John le Bener (1282) and Adam del Bene (1351).

2. Nickname

Some other origins have been proposed such as a nickname derived from the Middle English word *bene*, meaning "friendly, amiable, or pleasant"

3. Locational Origins (Binsted / Bean-stede)

Another origin for the surname in Sussex is locational, coming from the parish of Binsted in West Sussex, near Arundel. The name originates from the pre-7th Century Old English word *bēan-stede*, which literally translates to "a place where beans were grown". Binsted in West Sussex was recorded as Benestede in the Domesday Book of 1086. Over generations, families living near these fields or migrating from the village shortened or modified the location into surnames like Binsted, Benfeld, and eventually Bean. However, the Bean/Beane surname is far more common in East Sussex suggesting that this locational origin may not be the primary source.

4. Scotland

Clan MacBean (McBain) originating historically from the Inverness area.

The following charts show the distribution of the Bean/Beane surname in the 1881 census.

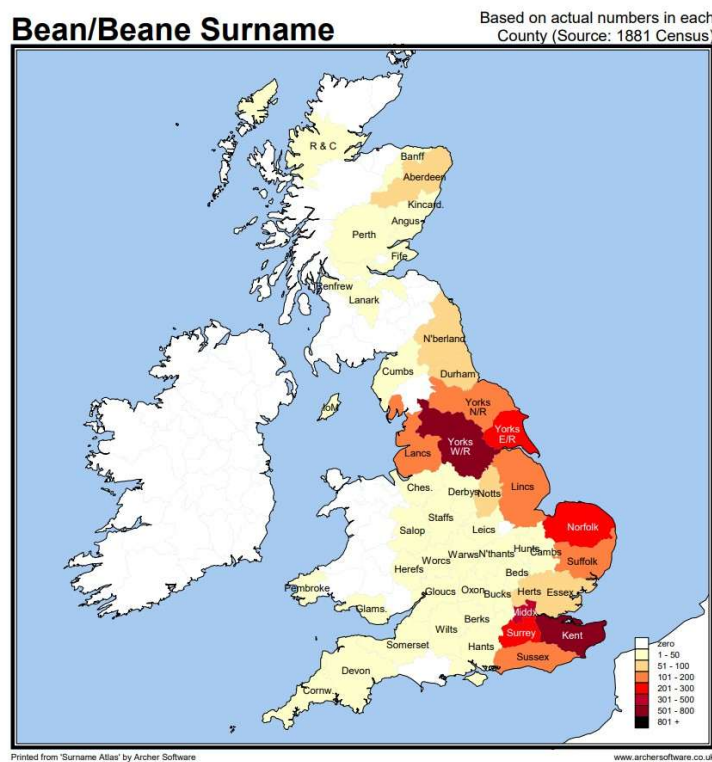


Fig. 1. Distribution of the BEAN/BEANE surname in England in 1881.

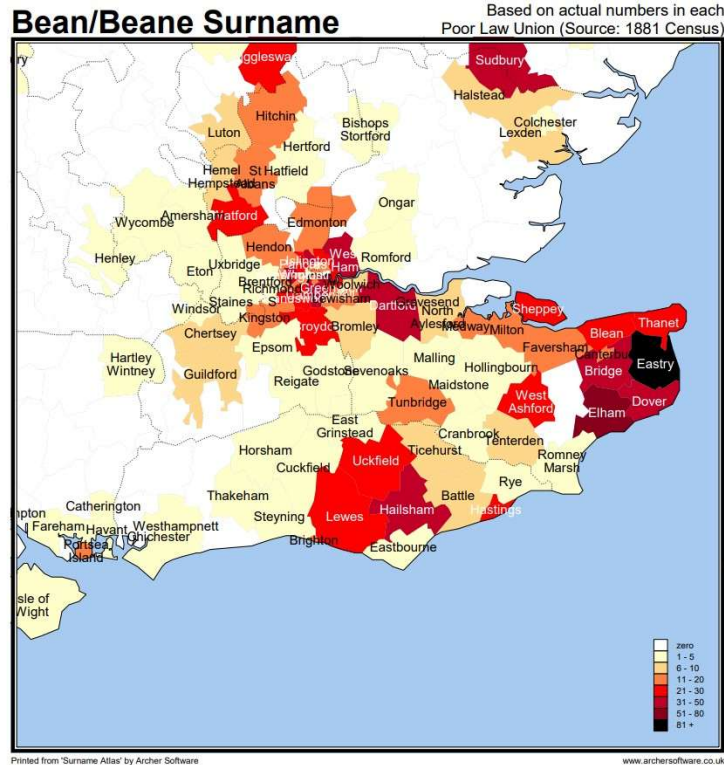


Fig. 2. Distribution of the BEAN surname in Sussex in 1881. The hotspots shown in Sussex – Hailsham, Lewes and Uckfield – are the focus of this book.

The Wills/Admons

This book brings together all the known wills and administrations (admons) of the Bean/Beane families of East Sussex before 1858, after which the Church of England probate courts³ were replaced by the Principal Probate Registry. It cannot be guaranteed that this is the complete set and future revised editions may be needed to incorporate new discoveries, including non-Bean wills that contain relevant information.

These wills & admons have enabled the Bean family trees in Sussex to be verified and further developed. Where possible, each will in this book is referenced to a family tree which places the will in context and highlights how other wills are connected. The trees are based on many years of research using primarily the Sussex Family History Group baptisms, marriages and burials indexes and the information gleaned from the Bean wills. I hope that

the wills and family trees published here will provide a basis for moving forward in our understanding of the Bean families in Sussex.

The book also provides three indexes which offer great value to researchers. The indexes are:

1. Wills by location.
2. Index of names occurring in the wills and in associated documents relevant to that will. These additional documents have generally been found by searching the ESRO on-line catalogue which often provides a detailed summary of the document's contents including names, dates and places.
3. Index of locations, local place names and properties mentioned in the wills and in associated documents.

The author wishes to acknowledge the Sussex Family History Group's Will Depository project and its long time coordinator, Rosie Ansell. Some of the transcribed wills in this book have come from there and all the new wills transcribed for this book have now been contributed to the Depository.

Conventions

The following conventions are used throughout this book:

1. The dates shown in the will titles are the probate dates, not the date the will was made (unless there is no probate date). To remove confusion, the year between 1st January and 25th March is written as, for example, 1592/93 wherever possible. Some historians want to leave it as written in the original document (e.g. 1592) and others (in the ESRO catalogue for example) write it as we would today; 1593.
2. In the indexes, "Beane" has been standardised to "Bean" to simplify use of the index. The original spelling of surnames is retained in the will transcriptions.
3. The family trees only show the year of events such as baptisms, marriages and deaths/burials. This has been done to simplify the appearance of the tree so the relationship between the people who left wills/admons is more clearly seen. The author is happy to provide charts with full dates for anyone interested (see contact details inside front page). Information concerning any errors or new evidence affecting family tree structures would be welcomed.

Chapter 1

This is the author's seventh "wills book of East Sussex" in which all the wills and admons for a particular surname are collected and analysed. The first chapter has always taken the form of an article, often to be later separately published in the Sussex Family Historian, discussing something of interest that has arisen from the project. A topic for this article has yet to be identified.

Chapter 2 - The Bean/Beane Family Trees

This section presents the main family trees associated with the Bean/Beane wills. The people who left wills/admons are highlighted in each tree which then form a visual index for related wills. These trees are an important part of this book and are the product of many years of research and analysis of parish registers (mostly the SFHG indexes), census records, miscellaneous documents and, of course, the Bean/Beane wills.

The dates given in the trees are years only. This was done to ensure that the trees remain readable, otherwise the pages become too crowded. However, the trees with full dates are on the author's website at <https://www.nynne.org/ui625.htm>

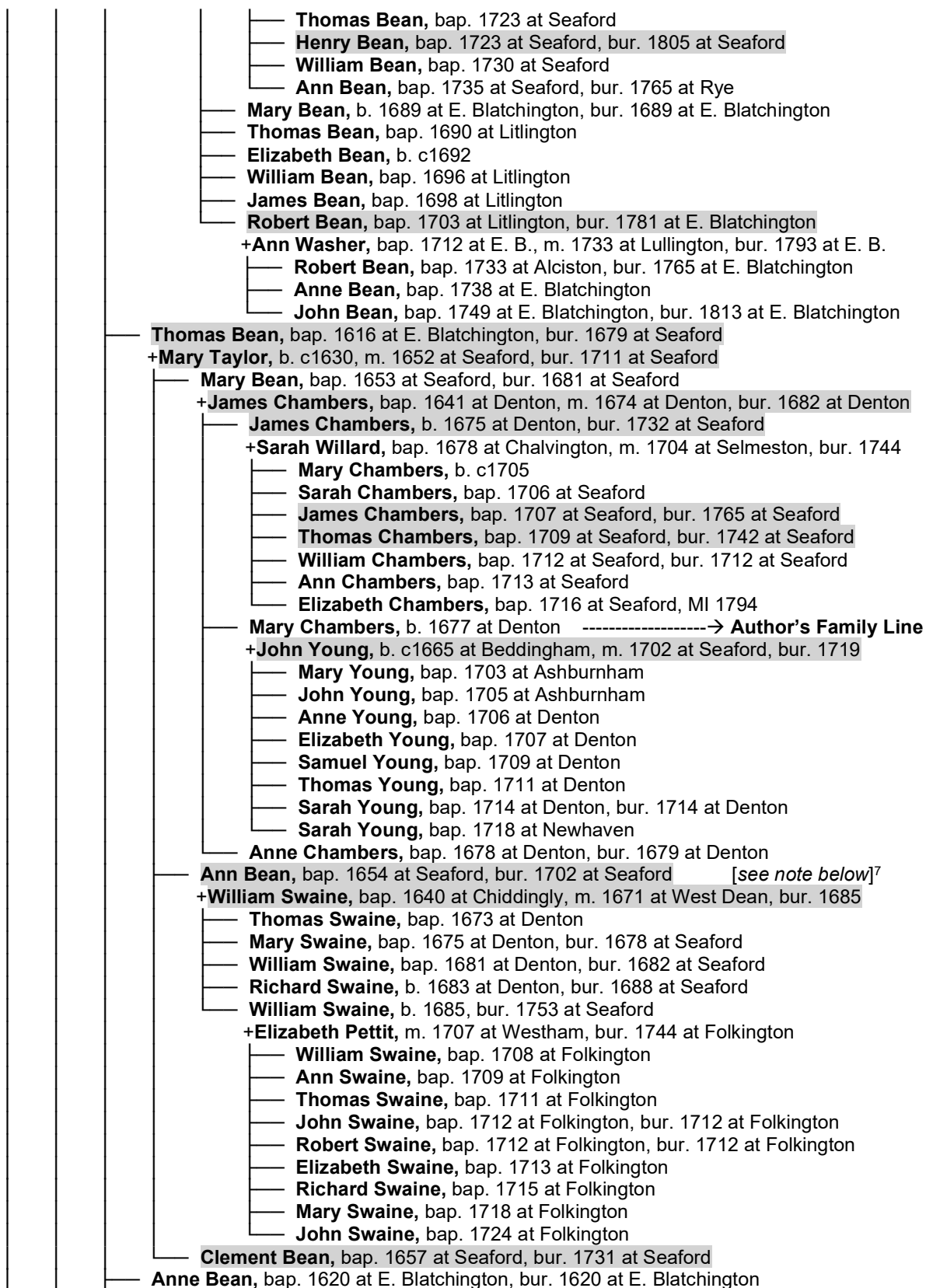

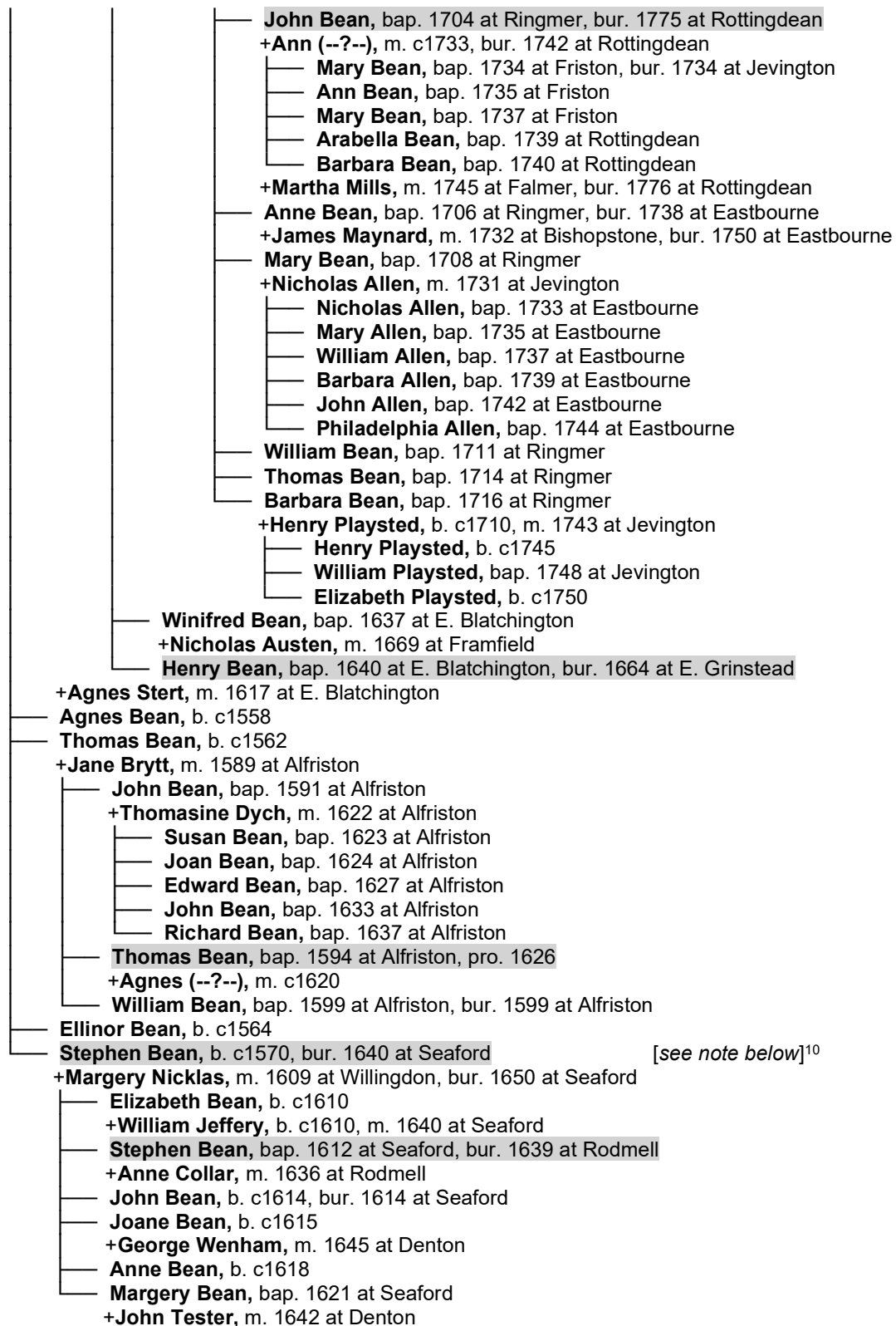

Tree 4. The Beans of Rye

There is an early record of a Bean at Rye: John Bean bap. 30 Sep 1576 at Rye, son of Nicholas Bean. The next Bean baptism at Rye does not occur until 1729.

The will of Thomas Bean, proved 12 Feb 1753 at Rye identifies four surviving children: Elizabeth, John, Mary and Sarah. Baptisms for Elizabeth, John and Mary cannot be found, highlighting the problems with researching this family tree.

The origins of Thomas Bean, the victualler who died in 1752 at Rye, are unclear. He may have been the Thomas baptised at Eastbourne St Mary on 1 Jan 1688, son of John and Mary Bean, but that is purely speculative. Adding to the confusion is another Thomas Bean, a butcher of Rye, who married Ann Kennett, spinster of Rye, on 23 Jul 1716 and who died shortly after, leaving a nuncupative will proved on 20 Apr 1717. This person has not been able to be placed in the tree below.

Given their occupations as victuallers and innkeepers, it is also very possible that they arrived in Rye from afar, possibly from Kent, to take advantage of perceived business opportunities. Rye was a town which saw many people passing through, especially mariners and soldiers. The story of Ann Ogle (nee Waun), second wife of Thomas Bean (c1690-1752) illustrates this. Her first marriage was to a soldier in London in 1710 and it appears that they spent most of their life in Rye (see "Will of Ann Bean, Widow of Rye, 1771").

It would appear that the Bean name died out in this line with the death of John Bean in 1777 at Rye.

John Beane was buried 11 Mar 1567 at East Blatchington St Peter.

Their son John Bean is presumed to have married Ellinor as there is a burial on 3 May 1587 of Ellinor Beane, “wife of John Beane”. The six children named in the will are therefore assumed to be the children of John and Ellinor, although having two children named John is confusing. However, while finding two living children with the exact same Christian name in a 16th-century English will is uncommon, it is not exceptionally rare. It does open the possibility of a remarriage, but not necessarily so.

The son John Beane (husband of Ellinor) is probably the one buried on 22 Mar 1619 at East Blatchington St Peter.

On the twenty-first day of March next, Let a caveat [warning] be entered so that nothing be done in the goods of the person of **Thomas Beane**, late of Southheighton, deceased, unless notification is first made to **Edward Blaker** or to his trustees named in the next will of the deceased. In the meantime, let it be held, etc.

¹⁴ In 17th-century English probate law, a caveat was a formal notice filed in an ecclesiastical court (such as the Prerogative Court of Canterbury or a local diocesan court). It effectively froze proceedings, ensuring that a deceased person's estate could not be distributed, and their will could not be proved, until the caveator (the person disputing or holding an interest, here represented by Edward Blaker) was formally notified and given a chance to voice their claims or contest the validity of the administration.

¹⁵ A nuncupative will is an oral declaration of a person's final wishes regarding their property, typically made to witnesses when the person is dying or facing imminent peril.

¹⁶ “Stilo Anglie” means “according to the English comutation”. Until 1752, the legal and ecclesiastical year in England did not change on January 1st; it changed on **Lady Day (March 25th)**. Because of this, any date between January 1st and March 24th fell into the *previous* year according to the English system. When the document notes a date as February 1640 *Stilo Anglie*, it means that by our modern calendar (where the year changes on January 1st), the year was actually **1641**. This will often be written as **February 1640/1** to clear up the confusion.

Henry Beane married Patience Knight on 12 Oct 1630 at Seaford. The will of their son Henry (see Will of Henry Beane, Glover of East Grinstead, 1664) indicates that his mother Patience remarried to Roger Tester of Framfield, although the marriage has not been found.

The reference to uncle John Bodle is another clue to discovering the origins of this Henry Bean:

John Bean was buried on 10 Jan 1749/50 at East Blatchington ("Mr.).

His marriage to Ann has yet to be found. Note that the original parish register for Litlington has been viewed and there is no entry for a marriage (c1719), or for the birth of their first two children, John and Ann (c1719-22). However, there is a very faded entry under "Churching Women 1721" which seems to read "Wife of John Bean churched ...". "Churching of Women" (formally known as The Thanksgiving of Women after Child-birth) was a religious ceremony or rite of passage performed after a woman gave birth, so this must have been after the birth of John or Ann, although their baptisms are not in the parish register.

There are parish register entries for the baptism of John and Mary Bean in March 1718/19 to John and Susan Bean. Both John Beans (the father and the son) were buried soon after and Susan remarried to Richard Stevens in 1723 at Litlington, so these are considered not connected to this Bean family. There is a marriage of John Bean and Susan Prodger on 3 May 1716 at East Dean which is likely them, but it is not known where this John Bean came from.

John Bean took over Clapham farm after his father Henry Bean's death in 1703 (see "Admon of Henry Bean of Litlington, 1703"). At some stage, he began aggressively buying up freehold land rather than just leasing. Crucially, he purchased the freehold of Lower Clapham (Clapham House and farm) Litlington in 1719 and Upper Clapham in 1736.¹⁸

According to the Cuckmere Valley Parish website:

"John Bean Snr died in 1749 having accumulated considerable wealth. He had developed his estate at a time of great change in agriculture. He deserted the small highly priced arable plots that had been farmed for centuries in favour of purchasing larger holdings formerly part of monastic estates. He exploited improved farm techniques to put downland to the plough and bred large flocks of Southdown sheep on the remaining downland, which became the leading breed of its day."

John Bean Jnr inherited the estate in 1749 and managed it well until he died in April 1785. At that time, Litlington "consisted of 20 cottages, the church, the farm and the 'big house', Clapham, from which the Bean family ...dominated village life".

There is a mystery here waiting to be solved in that John Bean's daughter, Ann Bean, married Henry Read, a very wealthy grazier in Brookland, Kent in 1748 (see "Will of Henry Read Esquire of Brookland, Kent, 1777"). How did this connection come about? The new farming techniques that were introduced to Litlington - broad scale sheep farming - would appear to be similar to farming practices around Brookland/Romney Marsh in Kent. Hopefully further information will be found in the future.

Despite John Bean's wishes to the contrary, his daughter Sarah did marry Benjamin Davis on 16 Nov 1750 at Hamsey. They had four children, all baptised at Hamsey, and are mentioned as beneficiaries in the wills of Sarah's mother, Ann Bean (pr. 1768) and her brother John Bean (pr. 1785) suggesting that the rest of the family did not disapprove of the marriage as much as her father did!

Ann is likely to be Ann WAUN who married George Ogle on 27 Feb 1710 at London (clandestine marriage).²⁰ The residence for George is given as “Cott Suttons Regmnt” which may be a mis-spelling of Col. Sutton’s Regiment. Richard Sutton was appointed Colonel of a newly raised regiment of foot on March 23, 1709. During this period, the War of the Spanish Succession was taking place, and Sutton’s regiment served in Flanders and Britain. The burial of George and Ann’s daughter Sarah Ogle at Rye in 1721 states that her father George Ogle is a soldier.

George Ogle died in 1740 at Rye leaving Ann a widow. Anne Ogle married Thomas Bean on 3 Dec 1741 at Rye, “Anne a widow, both of Rye”. There are no other OGLE marriages in the SFHG marriage index.

Anne Bean died 5 May 1770 at Rye, aged 85 years (from headstone). She was buried 9 May 1770 at Rye St Mary, “widow”. The following headstone is in the Rye churchyard:

Relevant Events

John Bean was buried on 19 Apr 1785 at Litlington (“Esquire”).

John Bean never married, but had a long term relationship with his housekeeper, Mary Bridgeman, with whom he had two children, John (1755) and Barbara (c1759).

He vastly extended the family empire, purchasing Charleston Manor in 1748 and the Manor of Litlington in 1756, absorbing it directly into the Clapham Estate. By this point, the Beans owned nearly the entire village of Litlington.

Monumental Inscription at Litlington Church:

Sacred to the memory of JOHN BEAN late of Clapham who departed this life 11th April 1785 aged 69. A gentleman well known for his superior judgement as a farmer and grazier as for his great punctuality in business in general. He was rather warm in his disposition altho truly sincere where he professed a friendship; a good master to his servants & ever attentive to the poor, but a man of no ostentation, his principal object was that of husbandry, and wherein this allowed. He made great improvements so that the world by his death lost a valuable member of society. The bulk of his fortune which was very considerable, and which he acquired chiefly by his own industry and good management, he left to his only son, JOHN BEAN, Gentleman, who in testimony of his gratitude and of the great regard he had for his father, caused this tomb to be erected.”

John Bean’s daughter, Barbara Bean, married Rev. William Hawes on 19 May 1783 at Berwick. William died and was buried at Berwick on 24 Mar 1784, “Rector of this parish”.

John Bean’s sister, Sarah Bean, married Benjamin Davis on 16 Nov 1750 at Hamsey.

Henry Read Jnr. was buried at Brookland, Kent on 7 Jul 1775. There is a family plaque in the church of St Augustine, Brookland:

Henry Read Snr married Ann Bean on 8 Dec 1749 at Brookland, Kent. His will makes it fairly clear that his wife is the sister of John Bean and Sarah Davis (nee Bean). Henry refers

to Sarah Davis of Ditchling as his sister (left 100 pounds) and John Bean his brother (also left 100 pounds). See “Will of Henry Read Esquire of Brookland, Kent, 1777”.

Sir Humphrey Bean of Waldron was an innkeeper. He was buried at Waldron All Saints on 27 Feb 1804.

He married Fanny Pearson on 25 Dec 1780 at St Marylebone parish church in London. They had five children born at Tudeley in Kent between 1784 and 1792, and two born at Waldron, Sussex in 1799 and 1800.

Humphrey was baptised at Southborough, Kent (near Tonbridge) on 24 Apr 1754 to parents Henry Bean and Jane Humphrey. He was never knighted, his parents simply named him **Sir Humphrey Bean** at birth, and so “Sir” became his legal christian name.

John Bean married Mary Hide on 13 Jun 1788 at East Blatchington. Mary was buried at East Blatchington St Peter on 10 Nov 1816. It appears that they had no surviving children, as none are mentioned in John's will.

In 1800, John & Mary Bean became the tenants of the manor house at Blatchington. The owner was William Chambers. His daughter Barbara Challen (nee Chambers) inherited it when William died on 7 May 1808.²¹

William Bean married Ann Farncomb on 1 Oct 1778 at Wivelsfield, both of this parish. The marriage licence dated 25 Sep 1778 states “William jnr cordwainer of Wivelsfield age 19+ years with consent of father William Bean cordwainer of Wivelsfield. Ann a spinster of the same parish, 25+ years”.

William Bean was baptised 23 Jul 1758 at Wivelsfield, son of William Bean and Mary Parsons.

William’s sister Mary Bean married George Martin on 4 Jun 1781 at Wivelsfield, both of this parish.

His brother Simon Bean was baptised 29 Nov 1773 at Wivelsfield St Peter & St John, son of William and Mary Bean. He married Mary Angell on 24 Jul 1796 at St Ann Lewes and was buried on 4 Mar 1819 at Lewes St John sub Castro, “45 years”.

William Bean’s parents were William Bean and Mary Parsons, married 11 May 1756 at Wivelsfield, both of this parish. The father, William Bean, was buried 3 Sep 1806 at Wivelsfield, “75 years”. He was likely the person baptised on 24 Jan 1730/31 at Wivelsfield, son of William Bean and Sarah Wisden. Note that Mary Parsons father, John Parsons of Wivelsfield, left a will (see “Will of John Parson(s), Cordwainer of Wivelsfield, 1747”).

Going back another generation, William Bean married Sarah Wisden on 26 Nov 1727 at Westmeston, with William “of Petworth”, so it would appear that he has no connection to the earlier Beans of East Sussex. A cursory look at the marriage records suggests that this line goes back further in Petworth at least to 1661.

The above transcription comes from the original will. The date of the will and the date of probate was taken from the copy of the will made at the time of probate.

Note: The father of the above children Anne [Daniel], Joane [Van], Martha Beane and Henry Beane was John Beane who died in 1659. The reference to “due to her by the death of Thomas Beane” in the will is thought to be a mistake. Although the father John Beane did have a brother Thomas, he died in 1679, after this will was made, and his will makes no mention of these children.

Both the children's father John Beane and mother Martha Beane (nee Seaman) died in 1659. However, no wills have been found for them.

The confusion may have come about because Susan's father-in-law was Thomas Seaman who also left a will in which the Susan's daughter Martha (mother of the above children) was left 10 shillings.

Another mistake in the will is that Susan Seaman was not a spinster, she was a widow.

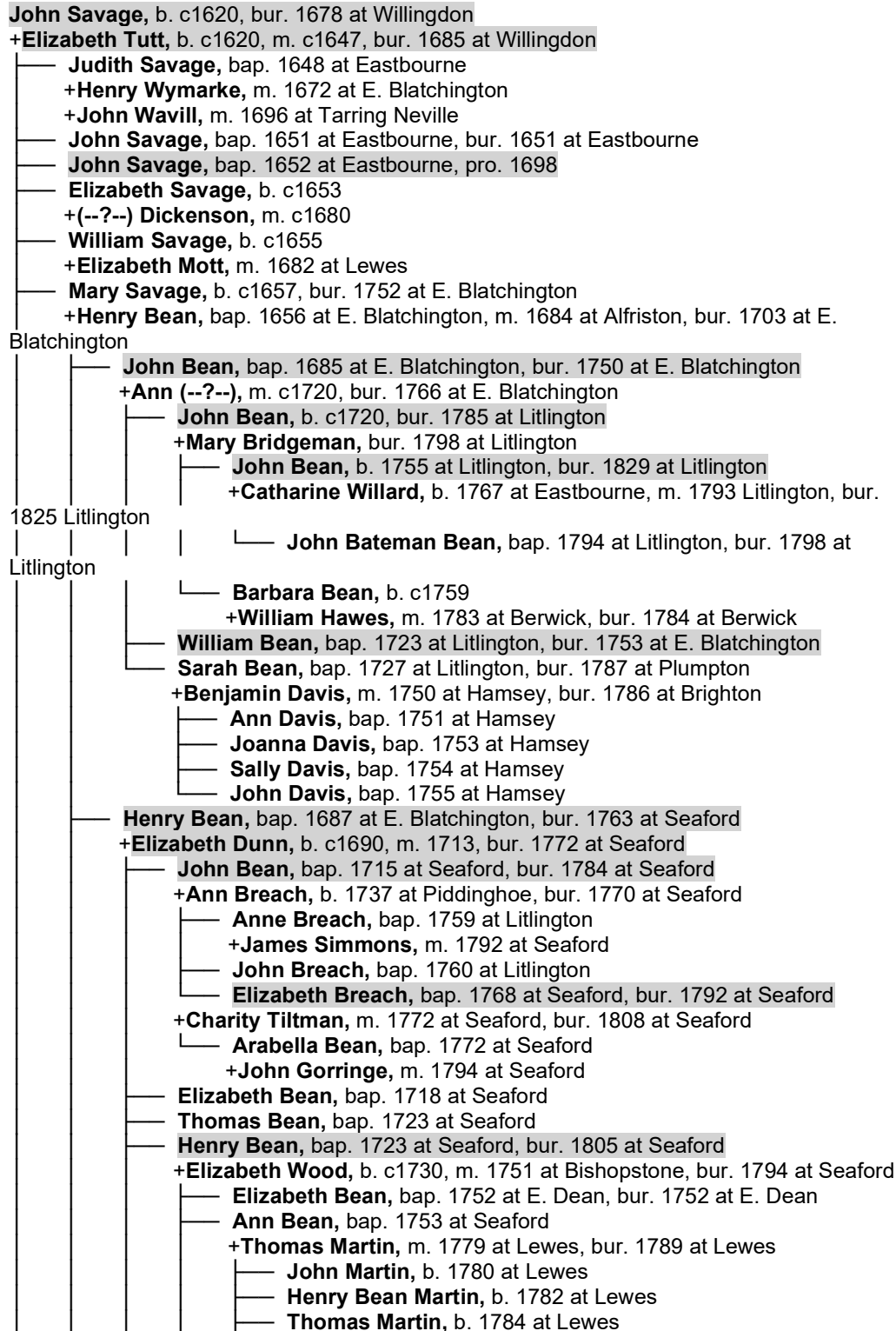

William STRETTON was buried on 2 Apr 1724 at Willingdon St Mary, "senior".

William STREATON married Elizabeth ITEN on 23 Sep 1686 at Willingdon, both of Willingdon.

His daughter Mary STRETTON of Willingdon married John BEAN, yeoman of Wilmington, on 25 Sep 1716 at Willingdon (marriage licence 21 Sep 1716, Archdeaconry of Lewes). The parents of John Bean are considered to be Thomas and Ann Bean of Jevington because of the following:

- 1) Both John Bean and Mary Stretton's parents were carpenters, and both sides were quite well off going by the wills. This is how John gets to be a yeoman, "of Park Farm".
- 2) Mary's brother Thomas died in 1724 and the probate inventory was done by William Bean and Thomas Sinnock, and both would have been family. Thomas Stretton's wife

was Katherine Sinnock, so Thomas Sinnock was likely her brother, and William Bean would likely be a brother of Mary Stretton's husband, John Bean. This fits perfectly with John Bean's parentage, as he did have a younger brother William.

- 3) The other candidate often shown for John Bean is the one baptised 1693 at Willington son of John Bean and Mary, however there is a burial for him in 1706, "son of John" so he must be discounted.

The Sarah Davis of Ditchling (in Sussex) mentioned in this will is John Bean's sister. Sarah Bean married Benjamin Davis on 16 November 1750 at Hamsey, Sussex.
